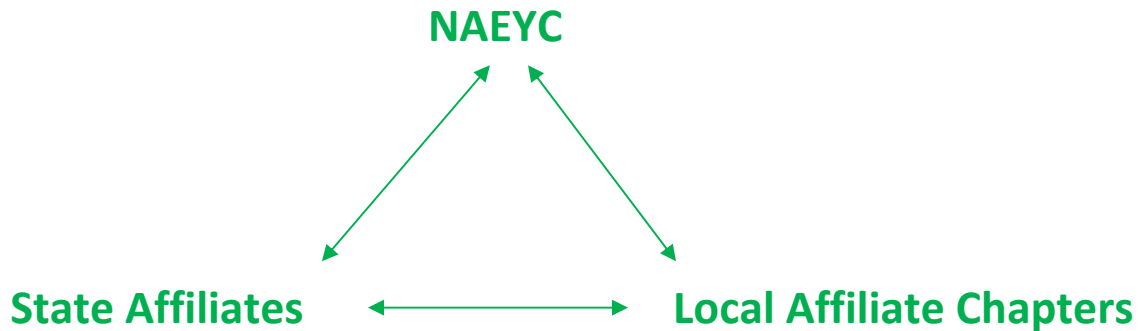


Current WAEYC Organizational Model:

State Affiliate with Local Affiliate Chapters

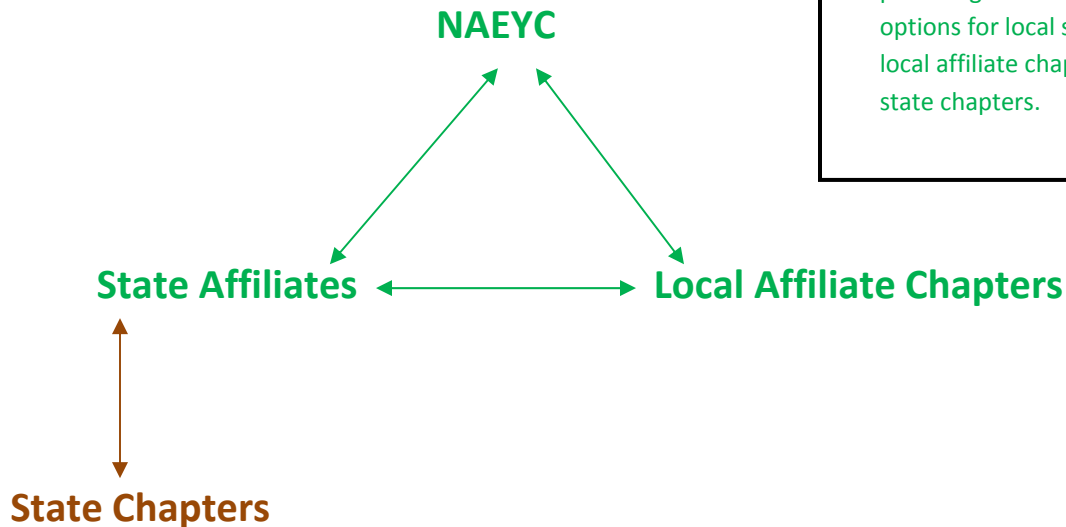


Accountability within WAEYC Organizational Model:

- State affiliates and local affiliate chapters are accountable to NAEYC
- NAEYC is accountable to state affiliates and local affiliate chapters
- State affiliates and local affiliate chapters are accountable to each other
- State affiliates and local affiliate chapters maintain good standing as an incorporated non-profit organization with 501c3 IRS status
- Each level of the association is accountable to the member through transparent governance, leadership opportunities and equitable benefits and services

Option 1:

**State Affiliate with Local Affiliate Chapters Plus
State Chapters**



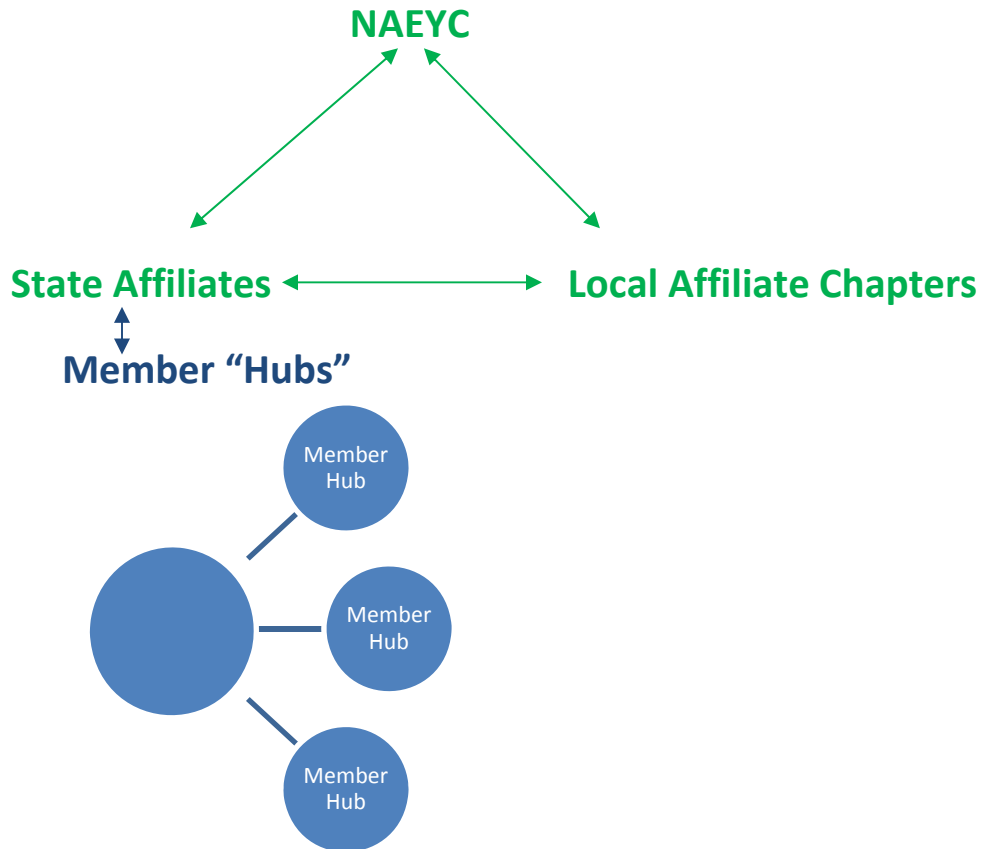
Note that this model allows for greater flexibility by providing the state with two options for local structures; local affiliate chapters and state chapters.

Accountability:

- State affiliates and local affiliate chapters are accountable to NAEYC
- State affiliates and local affiliate chapters are accountable to each other
- State affiliates and local affiliate chapters maintain good standing as an incorporated non-profit organization with 501c3 IRS status
- State affiliates and state chapters are accountable to each other
- State affiliate assumes legal and fiscal oversight of the state chapters
- State chapters still operate within a governance structure, policies and procedures
- Each level of the association is accountable to the member through transparent governance, leadership opportunities and equitable benefits and services

Option 2:

State Affiliate with Local Affiliate Chapters and Member “Hubs”



Accountability within Option 2

- State affiliates and local affiliate chapters are accountable to NAEYC
- State affiliates and local affiliate chapters are accountable to each other
- State affiliates and local affiliate chapters maintain good standing as an incorporated non-profit organization with 501c3 IRS status
- Member “hubs” are attached to an affiliate home (local or state) and are accountable to each other
- State or local affiliate assume legal and fiscal oversight of the member “hubs”
- Member “hubs” are organically driven by local member needs
- Each level of the association is accountable to the member through transparent governance, leadership opportunities and equitable benefits and services
